



Possibly a late 18c. stone privy, galleded, with brick svoids, boarded sables and tiled roof. Originally a "dry" privy, later converted to bucket type.

Walls inside plastered and painted blue. Un glazed window. Low arch in East wall, recently discovered, shows that originally it was a "dry" privy, for solids only - the floor having gentle slope towards the arch in the wall, which hole was covered with earth to mix with the "droppings", and later to be carted away for use as compost on the garden. Roof, galleded with weatherboarded spanels. Built into steep hillside, underneath an old yew tree.
