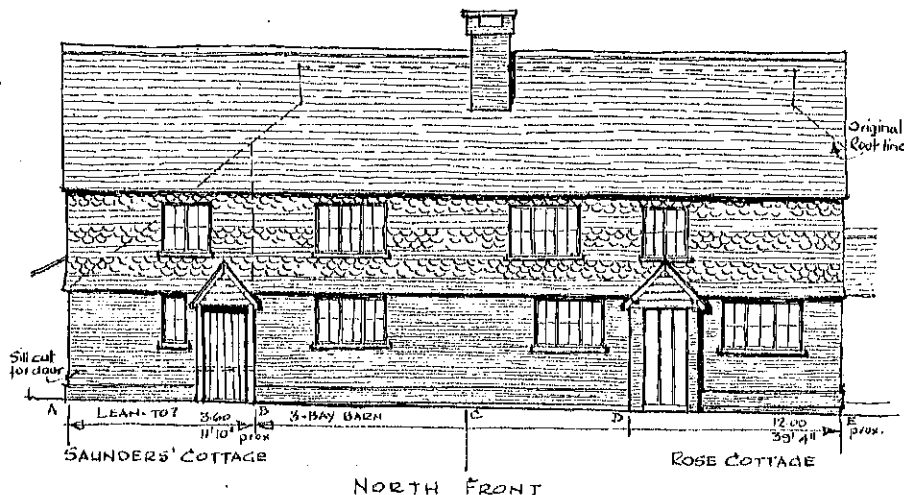


A 3-bay barn, possibly late 18 c. with possible open cart shed or cattle shed, converted in early 19c. into two cottages. The original roof remains within the new one, and had pegged rafters, half hipped ends, post posts and wind braces. It was only open to the North suggesting that it may have been a feed (or hay?) barn. Possibly for Left Hand Cottage next door which appears to have been a farm house. The East end had a high ironstone sill. Raking Queen struts, side purlins.

The present building is brick built with tile hanging to the first floor, a gabled roof and "central" chimney with two breasted ovens. The front has rows of shouldered fish scale tiles set among or plain ones. New roof has ridge board and two rows of side purlins. Bedrooms have double pitched ceilings - spine beams divide the bays in 2, lengthwise; rafters were then run up from the spine beams at an angle to meet the slope of the roof. Breasted ovens - v. fine brickwork, little used.
